Your Committee (definitely) needs YOU!

We now need to move into a different phase of interaction with the public, which will involve regular weekly openings throughout the year. And we really need your help.

It is our intention to try to get the new Ship Centre ready for opening by mid-June 2015 at the latest.

We are intending to open up to three days per week from 10am to 4pm and will need to have at least 2 FONS volunteers 'on duty' at any one time. With sufficient volunteers we could split the day into two 3 hour sessions, so no one needs to give up more than three hours of their time. We will also need a couple of 'reserves' to step in if someone cannot attend at the last minute.



We need FONS volunteers to "meet and greet", to act as guides, to staff the retail sales desk and to offer refreshments to our visitors. You will need to feel confident in encouraging visitors to donate to the project, to buy items from the Ship Shop, to join the Friends and to return (hopefully with relatives, friends and colleagues) to see future progress. We'll show you what each role entails and give you full support.

At the moment we have nearly 400 members but less than 20 active volunteers. We appreciate that many people are in work, including at weekends and have many calls on their precious free time. But if you could join a volunteer rota you would help to make a higher profile for the Medieval Newport Ship a reality.

Phil and Jeff joined two groups of participants to look at specific questions relating to the future of Museum provision in Wales and gave our conclusions to the review panel. The report from the Expert Panel is planned to be published by the Welsh government in June or July this year.

Ships and Shorelines: Maritime Archaeology for the 21st Century, 16 - 18 October 2015



The programme will include lectures on the work of the Maritime Archaeology Trust, new research on HMS Victory by the Royal Navy Museum, sub-sonic investigation of the 'lost' port of Dunwich, sea-level changes, investigation of Mesolithic and other submerged landscapes in Northern Ireland, the Mary Rose, the Dover boat, the Swash Channel wreck and the Must Farm log-boats.
